

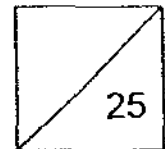

Miss Olsen, who is Habitat's Singapore Goodwill Ambassador, recalled seeing children in Cambodia walking barefooted in the dumps. It led to sores and bruises on their feet. 15

"We are spoilt for choice of shoes every day. For them, it is either one pair or none at all," she said.

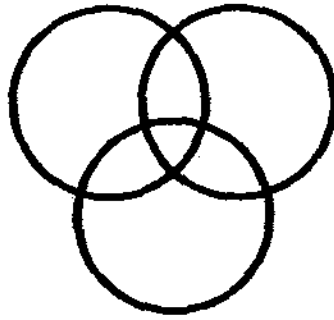
Habitat Singapore, which started in 2004, is a non-profit organisation that helps build houses for the needy in the Asia-Pacific region. 20

"What struck me most was the children having to walk barefooted in spite of their injuries. I wanted to raise the awareness of the plight of the Third World children to Singaporeans," said the event's organiser.

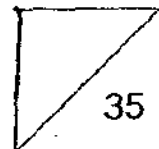
