Therefore, she followed a routine. Dinner was set as the time for sharing new things we learned each day. As children, we thought this was ridiculous but it never occurred to anyone of us to disappoint Mother. Each time my siblings and I gathered together in the bathroom to clean up before dinner, the question in our minds was "What did I learn today?" If the answer was 'nothing', we would go to our much-used encyclopedia in the study before proceeding to the dining room. Then, armed with our facts for the day, we were ready for dinner.

Dinner was a noisy time of clattering dishes and endless talk. The day's events were recounted, no matter how insignificant. Being the eldest in the family, I had to start first. My parents always listened carefully and were ever ready with comments such as, "That was a smart thing to do." or "You should have known better." When a conversation ended, another would begin. Silent moments were rare at our dining table.

The dreaded moment came when Mother looked at my siblings and me and in her usual cheerful tone, asked, "Now, tell me what you have learned today."
