On a May weekend in 1995, my world changed forever. I was competing in an equestrian event in Virginia when my horse, Buck, decided to put on the brakes just before the third jump.

When he stopped suddenly, momentum carried me over the top of his head. My hands got entangled in the bridle and I could not get an arm free to break my fall. At 1.8m and 98kg, I landed headfirst. Within seconds, I was paralysed from neck down and fighting for air like a drowning person.

I woke up five days later in the intensive care unit at the University of Virginia hospital. Dr. John Lane, head of the neurosurgery at the hospital, said that I had broken the top two vertebrae and that I was extremely lucky to have survived. He told my wife that I may never be able to breathe on my own again. However, my head was intact and my brain stem so close to the site of the injury appeared unharmed.

Dr Lane said my skull would have to be reconnected to my spinal column. He was not sure if the operation would be successful, or even if I could survive.

Suddenly it dawned on me that I was going to be a huge burden to everybody, that I had ruined my life and everybody else's. Why not die? I thought miserably and save everyone a lot of trouble?

As family and friends visited, my spirits were on a roller-coaster ride. I would feel so grateful when someone came a long way to cheer me up. Then the time would come when everybody had to leave and I would lie there and stare at the wall, stare at the future, stare in disbelief.

When I would finally fall asleep, I would be whole again. Then I would wake up and realise that I could no longer do many things; I was just taking up space.

One day my wife, Dana came into the room and stood beside me. I could not talk because of the ventilator. As we made eye contact, I mouthed the words, "Maybe you should let me go."

Dana started crying. "I am only going to say this once," she said. "I will support whatever you want to do because it is your life and your decision. But I want you to know that I'll be with you for the long haul, no matter what."

Then she added the words that saved my life, "You're still you. And I love you." I can't drift away from this, I began to realise.

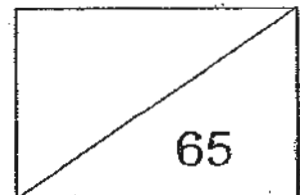

As a baseball player, Jackie Robinson won over the fans, his teammates – and his own hot temper. Robinson was the best base runner of his time and also the first African-American baseball player in the big leagues in this century. Someone once said, "Jackie Robinson is a fiery competitor, he did not just come to play, he came to beat you!"

In 1947, when Robinson was a rookie in baseball, baseball topped the sports world. It was also a tough time to be black. Black kids went to separate schools, black people had to ride in the backs of buses and there were even separate drinking fountains for blacks and whites. There had not been a black player in the major baseball leagues in more than 60 years. Blacks who are good enough to play in major leagues had their own teams and leagues. People who did not want blacks in baseball felt that blacks and whites should not compete.

When the baseball team, Dodgers signed Robinson, the club president, Rickey, told Robinson that he would have to curb his temper if he was abused or taunted by white players or fans. Upon hearing that, Robinson asked, "Mr Rickey, do you want a player who is afraid to fight back?"

"I want a player with enough guts not to fight back," Rickey said.

Robinson was the loneliest man in baseball in 1947. During spring training, half a dozen Dodgers players told Rickey that they would not play if he joined the team. Rickey put down that mutiny with stern words. Soon most of Dodgers players warmed up to Robinson when they realised that he was a good player and was helping them win games.

Opponents were not so friendly and they made it as tough as they could for the **black pioneer**. A few players tried to trip Robinson and he was hit by the baseball nine times. Many players and fans screamed racial taunts at him too.

"Plenty of times I wanted to throw in the towel when somebody insulted me for the colour of my skin," he said later.

Robinson was not only abused or taunted at the baseball field, he was not even safe from hate at home. He received letters threatening to harm him, kidnap his infant son or attack his wife. ~~Despite the great pressure he faced, Robinson had a good season.~~ Fans, black and white flocked to see Jackie Robinson play. He became a hero in black communities.

The Dodgers won the National league that year. Robinson was named National League Rookie of the Year. Robinson's success in the 1947 season paved the way for other black baseball players. From 1949 to 1952, Jackie Robinson was one of the two of three best players in baseball. His performance in 1949 earned him the league's Most Valuable Player award.
