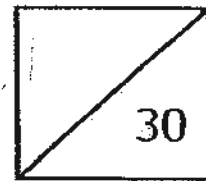

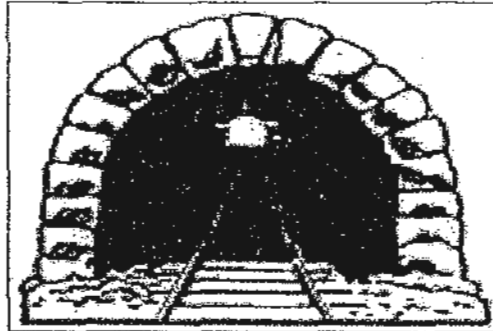

During the Bosnian civil war, a mortar shell exploded in the courtyard of Maja Kazacic's block of flats. The six friends she had been chatting with were killed. 16-year-old Maja was badly injured in both her legs. Fortunately, she was evacuated and sent to the United States. A few months later, Maja received her first prosthesis. However, as there was little bone left, it was hard to fit, and with her right leg also damaged, walking was intensely painful. 5

Maja endured the pain from then on until she spotted an injured dolphin at Clearwater Marine Aquarium, near her home in Palm Harbour in the United States. The young dolphin, Winter, who had lost her tail in a crab trap, caught Maja's eye. Maja had been watching the injured bottlenose dolphin swim around the tank. From a distance, the dolphin seemed approachable enough. 10

"She swam more like a shrimp than a dolphin. I identified with her," Maja cried. Trainers had fitted Winter with a high-tech tail - a flexible steel joint covered in silicone plastic, with a gel lining designed to protect a dolphin's delicate skin. When they were done, Winter streaked off through the water. Maja was mesmerized. She approached the trainers, who put her in touch with the inventors, Hanger Prosthetics & Orthotics in Bethesda, Maryland. Within ten days, Maja had 15 a new leg. With its soft liner and built-in microprocessor that adjusts the fit for different activities and terrains, Maja felt pain-free for the first time in almost 16 years.

As Maja lowered herself into the tank, she held out a hand to Winter, who approached cautiously, then glided away. After a few minutes, the dolphin let Maja stroke her back. Finally, Winter nuzzled up to her shoulder. Then the two embarked on an hour-long swim around the 20 pool. Maja's mother began to cry. When Maja climbed out, her parents embraced her. She would have shouted with joy had she not been aware of dolphins' sensitivity to noise.

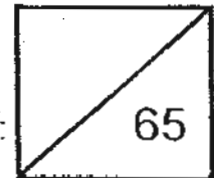

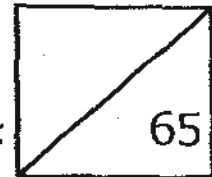

Out of one eye, he could see his grandfather, but when he turned to look, he would vanish. He knew he was not really there because his grandfather had died in 2002. It was day 27.

"We're going to be okay," he said to his visions. "We're going to make it."

He kept repeating the last line. Yet, he knew that his chances of survival were diminishing by the hour.

Todd Carmichael, a 44-year-old adventurer, is the first American to journey alone in Antarctica. He spent 39 days in Antarctica where he had walked almost 1130 km, pulling a sled. He had lost 23 kg and his chest was as tight as if his ribs were bound in plaster. The wind, sometimes reaching 160 km per hour, struck his body like a boxer's blows. There was also a chance of coming face to face with a pack of wolves or polar bears scavenging for food.

He suspected his feet were frostbitten. However, he could not take off a boot to check because if he did, his foot would swell and he would not be able to get the boot back on. He cannot afford this as he still had a long way to go. His face was battered and he had burn marks under his eyes. By day 27, his muscles had lost their elasticity and hung from his bones like loose rope. He had lost so much strength that he could hardly take another step. He had also been coughing up flecks of blood from frostbite on the lung tissue and that was when his hallucinations began.

The finish line, which was the research station at the South Pole, was so close he thought he could see it. The trouble was, he could not be sure it was not another hallucination. He faced a critical decision: keep pulling the sled and risk imminent collapse and death or drop the sled and walk without his gear and supplies. There was no margin for error if he misjudged the distance or if the station was not really there. He dropped the sled. "I won't leave you here. I'll come back for you later."

The sled was piled high with over 100 kg of supplies, mostly food, when Todd started more than a month ago. Ironically, the sled which now weighed 27kg, impeded his every movement. It had kept him alive and he had become emotionally attached to it. He unhooked it and started off with only his camera. Without the sled, he felt totally isolated and vulnerable. Nonetheless, he willed himself on.

Finally, on 21st December, he stepped onto the airstrip of the South Pole station. A woman came out and waved to him. Todd hesitated, unsure. He knew he looked bad and sounded confused. She took him inside and he could smell eggs and maple syrup on a buffet table. By now, he had not had a proper meal in almost six weeks and he wolfed down the pancakes and cookies within seconds.
